The Chance to Gain a 60-Vote Senate Majority

Key Senate Races

Working families have a chance to end the GOP Senate minority's chokehold on legislation and rebuild America's middle class. Democrats currently hold a slim 51-49 voting advantage in the Senate. But of the 35 seats up for election in 2008, Republicans have 23 seats to defend and Democrats only 12, giving pro-working family candidates a chance to win key races.

Here are some key Senate contests where IAM members can make a real difference on Election Day:

Kentucky

Incumbent Republican Senator Mitch McConnell is facing a tough challenge from his Democratic challenger Bruce Lunsford. Lunsford, the son of an IAM member, has pledged to support the Employee Free Choice Act, scrap Bush's tax cuts for the wealthy and include significant worker protections in trade agreements. As Senate Minority Leader, McConnell is a key member of "The Club" and is married to anti-worker Secretary of Labor Elaine Chao. McConnell's lackluster leadership of Senate Republicans and his close ties to President Bush will also work against him.

In the race to succeed five-term Republican Senator John Warner, former Democratic Governor Mark Warner is on track to easily outpace Republican Candidate Jim Gilmore. The popular Warner is known for fixing the fiscal mess he inherited from former Governor Gilmore. Also, during Warner's term as Governor, 121,938 new jobs were created in Virginia and 12,182 jobs at risk of being located elsewhere were retained. A Warner victory would put control of both Senate seats and the governorship in Democratic hands, furthering Virginia's transformation into a blue state.

New Hampshire



Jeanne Shaheen

Former Gov. Jeanne Shaheen is a tough challenger for freshman Republican incumbent John Sununu. This race is a rematch of the 2002 Senate race, which Sununu won by just four percentage points. An undistinguished first term for Sununu and national disapproval of the GOP make this race a great opportunity for a Democratic pick-up. As Governor, Shaheen launched New Hampshire's Children's Health Insurance Program, created a Job Training Fund to help New Hampshire workers and created 65,000 new jobs in the state. Sununu regularly fell in line with the Bush administration, voting against the Employee Free Choice Act and legislation that would have reduced Medicare prescription drug prices.

Two-term Republican Senator Susan Collins twice pledged to only serve two terms. Yet, she is currently seeking a third term against Democratic Rep. Tom Allen, who is proving to be a tough opponent. While Collins attempts to characterize

herself as a "moderate" and an "outsider." the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee reports she has collected more than \$800,000 from special interest groups this year alone. Collins voted to extend tax cuts for the wealthy and against the

Employee Free Choice Act. During his six terms in the House, Allen voted with working families 96 percent of the time, opposing flawed trade policies such as the Central American Free Trade Agreement and 'Fast Track' trade authority.

Coleman, meanwhile, has been an avid supporter of President Bush's agenda. In July 2004, Coleman's home paper, the Star Tribune, said Coleman had "morphed into an attack dog for President Bush."
