New Chapter Opens in IAM History

More than 100 years of IAM history come alive with the online debut of *Machinists' Monthly Journals* from the earliest edition in 1889 through its last year in 1956. The collection, which also includes *Machinist* newspapers published from 1946 to 1994, is the result of a two-year effort between Georgia State



University's Southern Labor Archives and the Machinists union.

"This has been a tremendous project to capture our history and make it available to our members, labor scholars and anyone interested in labor history," said Winpisinger Center Director Jim Leslie.

Thousands of pages of *Monthly Journals* and *Machinist* newspapers have been converted to digital PDF format and are keyword searchable, including name and topic. The collection is available at the Southern Labor Archives at www.library.gsu.edu/spcoll/labor.
