hange was in the air on January 20, 2009. Shortly after the stroke of noon – while under the watchful gaze of millions on the National Mall and billions more in front of television and computer screens here and across the globe – the United States of America officially inaugurated its 44th chief executive: President

Many in attendance – buried in several layers of clothing while braving the bone-chilling cold and engulfed in a sea of people – said it was like nothing they've ever experienced before. n "It was fabulous," said Joe Flanders, Directing Business Representative of IAM District Lodge 4, who traveled from Brunswick, Maine to Washington, DC, with his family and several other IAM members to witness the historic event. "For me and all the people around us, it felt like anything is possible. It's never been that way. Never have I seen a president come into office with the amount of excitement he's generated."

"My fellow citizens," said Obama in his first address as U.S. President. "I stand here today humbled by the task before us, grateful for the trust you have bestowed, "The time has come to reaffirm our enduring spirit; to choose our better history; to carry forward that precious gift, that noble idea, passed on from generation to generation: the God-given promise that all are equal, all are free and all deserve a chance to pursue their full measure of happiness."

mindful of the sacrifices borne by our ancestors... Let us mark this day with remembrance, of who we are and how far we have traveled."

Our new president is, undoubtedly, a man of many firsts. The most obvious, of course, is the color of his skin. But for many, Barack Obama represents more than just the first African-American president. He symbolizes a new beginning. A break from our nation's past. An end to the last eight years. A chance for new ideas and new opportunities. A new vision. A new hope. A new spirit.

First Priority: Recovery

job, and the president's desk is already filled with pressing issues – many of which impact working families. The good news is Obama has a commendable record on that score.

"In reaffirming the greatness of our nation, we understand that greatness is never a given. It must be earned," said the President in his inaugural address. "Our journey has never been one of shortcuts or settling for less. It has not been the path for the faint-hearted – for those who prefer leisure over work, or seek only the pleasures of riches and fame. Rather, it has been the risk-takers, the doers, the makers of things – some celebrated but more often men and women obscure in their labor, who have carried us up the long, rugged path towards prosperity and freedom."

Strong Record

Since being elected as a U.S. Senator in 2004, he's voted in favor of working families 98 percent of the time. He's voted to raise the minimum wage, provide overtime pay, equal pay and family medical

leave, to protect Medicare and children's health insurance, and stop the privatization of federal jobs.

In 2007, he introduced the Patriot Employer Act, which provides a tax credit for companies maintaining full-time workers, providing health insurance, preparing workers for retirement, and maintaining their corporate headquarters in the U.S.

He also voted against the Central American Free Trade Agreement and strongly opposed the Columbia Free Trade Pact. Obama pledged throughout his presidential campaign to protect our interests. And during his inaugural address, he acknowledged his intentions on making



good on that promise:

"The question we ask today is not whether our government is too big or too small, but whether it works," he said. "Whether it helps families find jobs at a decent wage, care they can afford, a retirement that is dignified. Where the answer is yes, we intend to move forward. Where the answer is no, programs will end."

Shore Up Economy

His first priority is to shore up America's failing economy.

Companies everywhere are scrambling to save money – at the expense of workers. The U.S. Labor Department reports that more than 11 million people are currently without work. Data shows 2.6 million jobs were lost in 2008 alone, at a speed faster than anything economists have seen since 1975. Sadly, the U.S. manufacturing sector continues to get hit with a record number of mass layoffs. Factory job losses totaled nearly 800,000 last year. Economists expect those numbers to mount.

With a record number of job losses and an unemploy-

Unemployment has jumped to levels not seen in more than two decades and could reach Depression-era numbers.

The Economic Recovery Team

The key to dealing with the issues and helping America get ahead not only lies with the successful passage of laws such as the president's economic recovery plan or the Employee Free Choice Act; what's equally important is *how*, if passed, these and other measures will be carried out. Or, more importantly, *who* will be carrying them out.



Joe Biden Vice President

Sen. Joe Biden has been tapped to head the administration's taskforce for rebuilding America's middle class. He will also serve as one of Obama's top advisors when dealing with the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, as well as the current crisis in the Middle East.



Hillary Clinton Secretary of State

As Secretary of State, Sen. Hillary Clinton will help the president rebuild the United States' reputation abroad. She will work to address the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, the crisis in the Middle East, the instability in Pakistan, and Iran's nuclear ambitions. She brings to the job a unique background having served as First Lady and New York Senator. She's also an honorary member of the IAM.



Hilda Solis Department of Labor

As the daughter of immigrant parents with union jobs, Rep. Hilda Solis pledged, "I'll work to strengthen our unions and support every American in our diverse workforce." She supports the Employee Free Choice Act, expanding job training programs, increasing the minimum wage, improving equal pay laws and making sure pension plans are secure.



Ray LaHood Department of Transportation

Rep. Ray LaHood is expected to play a larger role than past transportation secretaries thanks to the president's plan to create more jobs through public works projects. In addition to overseeing road and bridge repairs, LaHood will also have the task of improving the country's air infrastructure.



Tom Vilsack Department of Agriculture

ment rate threatening to reach double digits, Obama proposes an \$825 billion stimulus package. The plan is expected to include \$275 billion in tax cuts and another \$550 billion in government spending.

Remake America

"The state of the economy calls for action, bold and swift, and we will act," Obama said. "We remain the most prosperous, powerful nation on Earth. Our workers are no less productive than when this crisis began. Our minds are no less inventive, our goods and services no less needed than they were last week or last month or last year. Our capacity remains undiminished. But our time of standing pat, of protecting narrow interests and putting off unpleasant decisions – that time has surely passed. Starting today, we must pick ourselves up, dust ourselves off, and begin again the work of remaking America."

Despite Democratic cries that the amount is not enough to jumpstart the economy and Republican complaints that the country is already staring at a possible \$1.2 trillion deficit for the current fiscal year, Obama is urging Congress pass the legislation as soon as possible.

"For every day we wait or point fingers or drag our feet, more Americans will lose their jobs. More families will lose their savings. More dreams will be deferred and denied," said Obama earlier this year. "And our nation will sink deeper into a crisis that, at some point, we may not be able to reverse."

Also included in Obama's American Recovery and Reinvestment Plan are mea-

sures to rebuild the U.S. infrastructure while also investing in alternative energy. Translation: more jobs. At least three million, according to the president.

Rebuild Manufacturing

"We will build the roads and bridges, the electric grids and digital lines that feed our commerce and bind us together," he said. "We will restore science to its rightful place, and wield technology's wonders to raise health care's quality and lower its cost."



"He's talking about retooling America's manufacturing base," says IAM President Tom Buffenbarger. "Roads, bridges, the water system, the power grid and the supply of energy are going to create blue-collar jobs. The president is exactly right." Obama's plan also talks about modernizing schools and providing America's youth with the 21st century skills necessary to meet industry needs and compete globally.

"We could lose a generation of potential and promise, as more young

Americans are forced to forgo dreams of college or a chance to train for the jobs of the future," he said, also earlier this year. "And, our nation could lose the competitive edge that has served as a foundation for our strength and standing in the world."

Passage of the stimulus package is expected to come in early February.

Free Choice Act

Another key issue awaiting the new president's attention is one that hits home to the Machinists – exercising a worker's right to join a union. The Employee Free Choice Act (EFCA) would make it easier for workers to form unions by requiring businesses recognize a union if a majority of their employees sign cards indicating they want one.

For too long, workers have had to deal with employers who routinely fire, threaten and coerce employees in efforts to keep workers unorganized. close a worksite and 91 percent force employees to meet privately with their supervisors.

All despite research that shows allowing more workers to freely join unions and bargain with their employers will help rebuild the middle class, expand health care and improve retirement security.

Help Middle Class

The IAM has been working hard to get the Employee Free Choice Act passed. The measure cleared the House in early 2007, only to face a filibuster by a small group of union-busting Republicans in the Senate.

Obama voted in favor of bringing the bill up in the Senate that year. Although he told a group of trade unionists, "We need a president who doesn't choke sayA State of the second

Michelle Obama The New First Lady
