BWI Trade Union Pre-COP 30 Summit and Amazon Rainforest Mission



On March 24th, Woodworkers Chief of Staff Bob Walls, began his journey to South America with an arrival in Brasilia, Brazil on Tuesday, March 25th. The following day Brother Walls and the rest of the team jumped straight into action with a full schedule of pre-COP 30 meetings.

On Thursday evening, March 27, the delegation took a night flight to Macapá, in the State of Amapá. The next morning Brother Walls met with Oceias Nascimento, President of SINTRACONVAJ, and Claudio, the Vice President. Walls visited the Labor Inspectorate Generals and the

Employment Office, followed by a tour of the illegal lumber trade in Macapá. During the visit, Walls engaged with sawmill workers and explored retail locations involved in the trade.

Saturday morning marked the beginning of Walls journey deep into the Amazon Forests, where he visited TW Forests. Management shared their commitment to sustainability, showcasing their triple certification (FSC, PEFC, and Amapá State) and emphasizing their focus on worker safety health. Walls toured their production sites and observed how their forest products are made.

Later, Walls and the crew traveled further into the forest, met with an Indigenous family, and visited a logging site. There, a manager guided them through an area that had been logged five years prior, highlighting the forest's natural regeneration. He also provided insights into the specific logging methods used at the site.

The visit offered a powerful, first-hand look at both the challenges and the progress being made in sustainable forestry and labor practices in the Amazon region.

They represent members working for Green Diamond Resource Co, the County of Mason, and the City of Shelton and have about 70 members. Their limited funds have kept them from being able to send any members to the W3 Center for over four years.

After being selected as a Grant recipient, the Local voted to send Sister Kristine Howard, who will be attending Leadership II in September of this year. Sister Howard is a 10-year member of the W38 Executive Board as a Trustee and for 9 years has been the Shop Steward for the City of Shelton. Sister Howard said "I hope this opportunity gives me the knowledge to bring something useful back to our members and to help our Local grow." District W24 Business Representative Larry Beckett said, "I'm proud of Local W38 for receiving this Grant. They are going through a leadership transition, and this training will be a big help in developing the skills they need to be successful."

Winpisinger Center Director Mary McHugh said of the Grant program "nobody believed in the importance of education for the IAM, the labor movement, and working people more than Chris Wagoner. He was especially dedicated to opening up doors and taking down barriers to education for all members. The Chris Wagoner Memorial Leadership Grant program does just that - it gives leadership training resources to IAM Locals which might otherwise not be able to take advantage of W3 Center leadership training. This is a real and appropriate living memorial to Chris and his work."

Woodworker International Representative Billy Barnwell said, "The Chris Wagoner Leadership Grant is a perfect opportunity for Woodworker Locals, many of whom struggle with the exact conditions this program seeks to alleviate." Applications for next year's Grant are open now and can be found at W3iam.org in the "About" section. Applications must be received by November 1, 2025 to be considered for 2026 Awards.

Baltimore Tree Keepers

The Baltimore Tree Keepers program is an initiative of the City of Baltimore dedicated to increasing the city's tree canopy. Managed by the Forestry Division of the Department of Recreation and Parks, Tree Baltimore collaborates with city, state, and federal agencies, nonprofits, neighborhood groups, and residents to plant and care for trees throughout Baltimore.

By joining the program, residents contribute to a healthier, more sustainable urban canopy while becoming part of a growing network of dedicated tree advocates.

Since its inception in 2013, more than 1,100 people have participated in Tree Keepers training, gaining essential tree care skills that directly benefit Baltimore's urban canopy. These volunteers aren't just tree enthusiasts—they're highly trained in tree planting, identification, and maintenance, including pruning techniques that rival those of some professional arborists.
